




Weekly Newsletter

Q&A with an Academic and Professional Fund Recipient: Aurora Martinez del Rio with the Chicago Linguistics Society, Department of Linguistics

Q: What was the event that your organization used A & P funding for?

A: The event was hosted by the Chicago Linguistics Society, we are an RSO connected to the linguistics department. This RSO is mostly focused on hosting a big yearly conference on linguistics with scholars, from all over the world presenting and it sets a venue for graduate students and even undergrads to go an engage with new research in the field. It was three days of talks, so we had invited speakers that were all big names in their field to come give presentations, typical conference talks and social meetings for students to come together and have a discourse about their own research and interests.

Q: What did the A&P help fund for this?


A: The event was online last year so we used the A & P funding to pay to make the event maximally accessible for anyone that wanted to come so the funding vent to cover the cost of interpretation from English to ASL. We had more than 300 total attendees to the virtual event and many people could come because it was fully accessible. We run this conference annually but this is the first time that we utilized this source of funding. Interpretation is wildly expensive so it was great to have access to the A&P fund.

Q: How did you hear about the fund?

A: I heard about it from another graduate student that had previously received funding

Social Media Content




A&P Fund: General Event Applications




95% of A&P-funded events this year were open to more than one graduate division

Community, Social, & Wellness Fund

Community, Social, & Wellness Fund

Fall

- 13 applications approved for \$22,410
- Events included Diwali Night, a Latin American Thanksgiving celebration, and wellness initiatives including yoga and rock climbing
- CSW also supported the Social Impact Summit and provided funding for the International Graduate Student Advisory Board and Diversity Advisory Board

Winter

- 11 applications approved for \$17,271
- Events included the graduate student blood drive competition, a lunar new year celebration, technology conference, wellness talks, and much more

Spring


- 4 applications approved for \$8,513
- Events include student softball league, CPR classes, Ramadan Iftar dinners, networking events, and graduation socials
- Helped support Grad Council's Spring Formal by subsidizing 100 additional tickets
- Three more funding deadlines this quarter, so we expect most of our funding to be used up by the end of the quarter

Research & Personal Development Fund

Budget: \$110,000

Purpose	This fund incorporated the personal development (PD) aspect at the onset of the pandemic. This year, travel restrictions were lifted and the fund operated to allow both travel and PD aspects.
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Responsibilities fund.

As COVID restrictions eased, the traveling aspect for research conferences were back in the scope of the fund. Also, research projects and internships were brought into the fold of the fund.

Research Fund:

- In-person and virtual conferences registration/attendance fees, membership fees.
- Traveling for research projects and internship.
- Food, airfare, car and gas, lodging for travel were covered, just like during pre-COVID.

Initiatives

Personal Development Fund:

- Online courses, certifications, or bootcamps for building a certain skill or generating knowledge
- Licenses for research tools or software
- Professional networking events
- With these awards, we encouraged creativity and aimed to be flexible



- Budget: **\$110,000.**
- Max Values:
 - <u>Research</u> Awards (<u>Travel</u>): **\$600** if presenting, **\$300** if not.
 - <u>Research</u> Awards (<u>Non-Travel</u>): **\$300** if presenting, **\$200** if not.
 - <u>Personal Development</u> Awards: **\$300**






Research & Personal Development Fund











Research & Personal Development Fund







- Pritzker (\$26,400) and SSD(\$24,800) received the most funds.
- Pritzker (13.3%), Humanities (5.6%), and SSD (4.31%) received the most awards as a percentage of their graduate unit population
- 2.61% University of Chicago graduate students have received RPD Funding in 2021-2022







SP&E - Gargoyle Gala Attendees by Division







SP&E - Rock Bottom Attendees by Division

Programming Overview

- Activities Circles (225 people): inter-school clubs centered around activities like climbing, fiction book clubs, and fiber arts
- **Graduate Families (225 people):** inter-school social groups centered around Chicago neighborhoods
- **Fire Event (150 people):** Food trucks, plants, and summer games
- Ice Event (200 people): Ice skating, 90s tunes, cupcakes, churros and hot cocoa
- Chicago Neighborhood Tours (180 people): 6 trolley trips to 3 different Chicago neighborhoods
- **Celebrating the South Side (400 people):** South Side jazz ensemble and 8 family owned restaurants






